Objective 1: Discuss the reasons behind the revelation of the Qur'an in shaping Islamic teachings and values.(Qur'anic verses 2:129, 36:82, 61:6, 2:2, 2:106, 5:3,12:2-3 and 3:3)

Reasons Behind the Revelation of the Qur'an
